

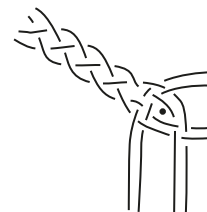
Scallops edging in Dutchlace.

Although I didn't find where, how or when this pattern was published, I dare to say this is a Dutch lacet. The main parts are very similar to those from the Dutch lace.

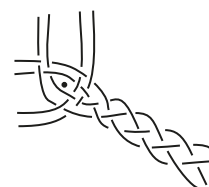
It is a very simple lace with the scallops made in cloth stitch with on the outside a whole stitch. Between the scallops plaits are made..

Necessary: 10 pairs of bobbins with DMC 80 or similar thickness.

When a plait has to enter into the cloth stitch, it is done as follows: Work the runners through the pairs of the plait. Place the pin under the runners between the pairs of the plait and take the latest worked pair of the plait as runners to the other side.



When the plait comes out of the cloth stitch, it is done as follows: Work the runners until the end of the row. Place the pin under the runners between the last two hanging pairs. The most outer hanging pair becomes the runners to go to the other side. The former runners and the hanging pair next to it make together the plait.



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
